


Sprint has launched a new service called Sprint Family Locator. The service allows parents to locate their child on a map through either an internet site or through their phone.

"Sprint Family Locator is a valuable tool that can help parents and guardians have a better sense of their children's whereabouts when they're apart," said Danny Bowman, vice president of product marketing for Sprint. "This is the latest Sprint innovation that uses GPS technology to improve the way families connect, communicate and locate one another."

Sprint Family Locator requires parents to list up to four phones they want to be able to locate. Registration requires activation on both the "parent" phones as well as the child phones. When a parent wants to find a child, the child can be located on a map along with a street address and surrounding landmarks.

One feature that I think is pretty cool about Sprint Family Locator is that the child is notified by text message whenever a parent is snooping on them. A geofence (actually the exact opposite of a geofence) can be setup to notify parents when a child arrives at a specified location. Reports can also be generated from the internet site.

Spring will charge \$10 per month for the Sprint Family Locator and you can register up to four phones and dispatch 100 text messages to each child phone per month. The service to locate someone else is currently available on 17 phones while there are 30 GPS enabled phones which can be located through the Sprint Family Locator service.

We've already seen both sides of this issue with GPS technology. There have ben court cases of people tracking their spouses with GPS technology. We've also seen cases where people have been in vehicle accidents and were unable to tell 911 operators where they were. GPS

coordinates were obtained from the caller's phone and lives have been saved. (You can read a little about this here.)

Most phones with built in GPS technology have a way where you can dictate when that information is sent. Most have an option where you can specify that your coordinates are only sent when calling emergency numbers.

14. I have found that the service tells that the phone is "Off" when it is actually "On" and can be very far off on on Real Time when the phone is where it is. My real time example is I am looking to see if my children have left a weekend place with my ex husband and the service says they are still 100 miles away when they are home safe and sound and their phone is in my hand and turned "on". Another example: I wnted to see where my wife was so I knew where our kids ball game was, knowing she was at the ball game, the service showed her phones as being more than 5 miles away from where she really was. I confirmed this by driving to where I thought the game was and she and her phone was there. When we got home I check the service and it said her phone was "Off" when it was in my hand "on". I would reccomend not to rely on this service...

15. I have used this service for about a year for my teenage daughter. I have the service set up on her account, so it never sends her a message that it is locating her. If you set up someone on another account to be located, first they have to approve you to do that, then each time they are located it tells them that you located them.

• You can not track them if the phone is off. It must be powered for GPS data to be available. However, you can suspend their service if they deliberately turn it off to prevent you from tracking them and since while off, no one can reach them anyhow, why not turn off the service until you get the child's attention? The child can ALWAYS dial 911, even if service is suspended. I would suggest, first infraction of rule "do not turn off phone or GPS" to be one day without phone, texting, voicemail, etc. Second infraction should be three days without service. Third infraction should be one week without service. Fourth infraction, two weeks without service and if there is a fifth infraction, two weeks without phone service and change their phone number when they

get it back, so their friends will all need to update their phone #s, which will take effort for the child to communicate it to all of them and perhaps tha will get the message across to the child. There is no charge for changing the number or suspending or resuming service on a Sprint phone line.

18. As a teenager, I would rather turn my phone off the whole night and not allow myself to be contacted by anybody rather than my parents snooping. Your actual service provider can always track the phone if you suspect your kid of being kidnapped instead of your kids feeling like they live with untrusting parents.

• Melanie, there is a problem with your solution to turning off the phone to avoid being tracked. If your parents pay your phone bill and your phone is on their phone account (required to use Sprint Family Locator with your phone), they can call Sprint at any time and have your service suspended (i.e. temporarily shut off) leaving you with no phone service to call friends, no text messaging, no voice mail, etc. with your friends and your parents can punish you for deliberately turning it off to avoid detection, since if you have it off, no one can contact you anyhow, so why not turn it off until you learn to keep the phone on? Do you really want your friends to receive the message "your call can not be completed .. temporarily suspended" which may be obvious you are being punished for something? May want to think about it.

She told me that she used the Family Locater to check on me and it said I was clear across town. I told her that couldn't be; that she must have read the map wrong. This is a second wife and she would think my daughter would stick up for me, so I wouldn't even suggest that she talk to her.
