- 7. On September 13, 2004, I posted the blog post titled "In The Beginning was the Bugaboo" available at https://daddytypes.com/2004/09/13/ in the beginning was the bugaboo.php (hereinafter the "Bugaboo blog post"), a copy of which is attached as Exhibit 1.
- 8. The Bugaboo blog post featured images of Bugaboo products I obtained from bugaboo.us and posted with Bugaboo's permission.

In The Beginning was the Bugaboo

While Bugaboo the Company launched in 1999, and Bugaboo the Frog only made it to the US in late 2001, Bugaboo the Concept began over ten years ago.

With some help from Bugaboo US' marketing department, Daddy Types put together a brief illustrated history of the evolution of the Dutch stroller that launched a thousand...whatever, it's a cool, expensive, well-designed stroller.

It all started in 1994 when...





little Max Barenbrug was working on his graduate 'mobility' project at the <u>Design Academy</u> in Eindhoven, where he followed in the footsteps of contemporary Dutch design stars like Marcel Wanders and his Droog collaborators. [To get an idea of the reigning ethic, the Academy's site notes that, after functionality, "the main characteristic of Dutch design is generally its restraint and austerity."

Anyway, the resulting study was a versatile rethinking of the stroller which shows several design features--the basic X-shape, off-road tires, the

wheelbarrow conversion (which is so unique, I've never seen or heard of anyone ever doing it outside the Bugaboo demonstration video; maybe it's a Dutch thing.)--that carried through to the commercial version. It won some award, and Max presumably became famous and envied among his graduate student peers.





Max teamed up with his brother-in-law, Eduard Zanen, MD, to develop the rig into a product, which the pair introduced at the 1997 Cologne Design Fair. This prototype showed marked ergonomic improvements for the seat, which was still low, an integral part of the overall X-structure.

With the introduction of the Classic (the black model at the top of the page) in 1999, the design evolved to incorporate safety features that raised the seat up above the crossbars. And besides the addition of a

bassinet, the only significant changes so far have been aesthetic and brand-related (i.e., colors, new logo, new model name, accessories).

A used Classic now sells for �325-400 on Dutch sites like <u>marktplaza.nl</u>. No word on the availability of the prototypes. Tempted? <u>Check out the Bugaboo Frog at babystyle.com</u>. [If everyone in China just buys *one* Bugaboo, they'll be the biggest corporation in the world.]

Confort car seats; they had the smaller, more manageable Elios, not the giant egg-shaped Creatis. You can also snap on regular stroller seats (the front one seems to dangle in space) or a seat/bassinet.

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

How Sweet Is The iCandy Apple Stroller?

filed under: strollers



Besides the fact that it will never be sold in the US with a name like iCandy Appleand I'm surprised the Beatles and/or Apple haven't gone after them already, never mind the Bugaboo folks--I don't know much about this UK stroller.

iCandy appears to be a premium brand created by <u>Little Shield</u>, an otherwise unassuming, third-generation, family-owned British baby gear company who likes to do things the old-fashioned way. Like making you send the brougham down to the dry goods outfitter to collect your iCandy--or even to find out the price; they don't allow their products to be sold online, and they make you call even to find out the stockists. Needless to say, there's almost no product info or reviews out there, either, beyond the chirpy catalogue copy.

So if anyone has any firsthand experience shopping for or using an iCandy Apple pushchair/stroller, by all means, please share. Otherwise, here's what catches my eye:

- The style is nice enough, but then, it's meant to look like a Bugaboo. [One DT reader has said they were pitched the iCandy as a "Bugaboo alternative which costs 100 pounds less."
- That'd put the Apple at around 400 pounds, well above a Quinny Buzz (which goes for 330, but can be found for 270), and a little more than a Phil & Ted's (370). [Apparently, the UK is a whole other country, with its own currency and stroller safety regs, which makes prices crazy high. And which drives 5-10 Brits to email me each week asking if I know any US retailers who'll ship them a Bug. (No.)]
- But if we're going to start down the lookalike road, how about putting an Apple next to the <u>First Wheels City Elite</u> [left, red], which itself looks like the i'Coo/Hauck Infinity/Rock Star Baby stroller, and which sells for under 200 pounds?
- What the iCandy Apple loses in price, it makes up in volume. With the stroller seat, the Apple weighs in at 13.6kg, about 30 lbs. I hope there are no stairs between where you are and where you're going. Both the Cameleon and the Phil& Ted's are 9kg, or 20lbs. Still, it's lighter than a Mt Buggy Urban, which is 35lbs.
- One unique feature of the iCandy Apple is its 3- or 4-wheel conversion option. From the look of it, the front wheels fold toward each other and lock for "3 wheel jogger mode." Please correct me, real joggers, but I've always thought that these small, solid front tire rigs are just not good for actual running.
- Other things like Maxi-Cosi carseat adapters, a carrycot option, and front/back-facing seat all seem familiar. The round Apple logo on the footmuff looks familiar, too, especially at a distance.

Two "Internet" sites? Poppycock, just change the colour a trifle! <u>iCandy UK</u> site, <u>Little Shield site</u> [icandyuk.com, littleshield.co.uk]

Baby Boom 2000--no name change yet!--has boilerplate on the iCandy Apple [babyboom2000.co.uk]

It does indeed look cute but it is very heavy and it is also cumbersome and bulky when folded. To get it into 3 wheel mode from 4 you have to remove the bar and slide the 3 wheels off and slide on the other set so not as the picture perceives.

I have to say I am a very happy Bugaboo Cameleon owner and I was very reluctanat before buying it and I did test the First wheels city elite out but to be honest the only thing is if you want a bugaboo the feeling never goes away til you get one. I knew I just wouldn't be happy with a look alike and I also thought other would think I was a bugaboo wannabe with a look a like. The bugaboo has been well tested when i have taken it to Norway and it has out performed any other pushchair I have owned (which is quite a few!) over various terrains.

My sister-in-law was brand-washed into buying the Cameleon in January but we saw the iCandy and fell in love with (dare I say it!) its sexy styling. What really put us off the Cameleon was the slope of the carrycot towards the babies head (to which the retailer replied - put a couple of bricks at the foot end to balance!) The iCandy has Carrycot stabilisers.

We have been so happy with the iCandy and the everyday admiring glances and comments that we get certainly testify to this. It has been 100% reliable and has met every challenge including two rigorous holidays (vacations.)

Hi-

Another 'Mum' review of the iCandy Apple from a 'Real life' user. We chose the iCandy Apple as it seemed to have more features like forward / rear facing pushchair, the handlebar is moveable (which is good for short & tall people because you can adjust it depending on who is pushing), you can lock the car seat onto the frame with no hassle, a large shopping basket, great design etc

We have found the icandy very good as we are 4 months in. The downsides are; our daughter has nearly outgrown the carrycot so we are having to put her in the pushchair early (she doesn't seem to be complaining), poor instructions - someone had to show us how to put the puchchair into the recline position, the foot bar of the pushchair doesn't lie flat therefore when it is in recline mode our daughters feet are in the air. Finally the art of collapsing took a while as it really is a knack but once you have mastered it is a doddle (just do as Jeff says).

We paid £399 for the pushchair, carrycot combo and an additional £99 for the maxi cosi car seat and think this was good value.

We hope this helps.

We bought an icandy becasue it did everything that we wanted (allowed baby to lye flat when first born, when sitting the baby can face pusher) - It has been brilliant, we've taken it on the beach - on sand, round the city, through country tracks, deep mud and grass.

The basket below the pram is big and quite easy to access - I managed to take my holiday packing all under the pram - and it;s big enough for all my local food shopping including a big veg shop.

Now my Baby is bigger he's sitting up facing me - here is the only snag... The recline position is not flat and my baby has to sleep with his feet in the air! (he's never in there for long when sleeping - so he;s alright and when he wakes up it;s easy to allow him to look around again.

The buttons on the side of the pram are awkward to manouver - they require alot of pressure.

This is a great pram for tall people, the hand rail can extend and the baby is not too low (like the bugaboo - which was at my husbands knees).

Although we'd have loved the pram in a different colour - it hasn;t got dirty yet (7months later).

Overall we like a lot and I'm pleased we bought it.

At least with the 'heavyweight' of the apple you're gonna be losing a lot more weight if you were just pushing a feather around.

I bought the stroller and carrycot combi and the price of it was £399 but the shop had a 10% day so i got it for £360 and got the maxi cosi car seat off ebay for £30. It was quite easy to buy as i went to an independent nursery shop and they had it in there. It was easy really! We have had the iCandy Apple for about 2 months and have had a mixed experience.

It really is quite hefty but the main difficulty is the fold-down size. One trick we've learned is to pop off the front and back wheels which makes it a much smaller beast!

Out handle got stuck too almost immediately after we got it and we couldn't fold the thing for weeks! We found after trial and error that a good shot of WD40 into the joints did the trick beautifully and now we have no problems. It was probably stuck up with sand and dust as we live in Cairo!

On that note, it really is a very smooth ride for our 1 year-old daughter. WE switched to the 3 wheel mode as the streets here make the pot-holed British roads look like olympic race tracks!

I would really recommend this pushchair, and we are especially pleased that we will be able to make it a very classy double when we have baby number 2! Has anyone bought the iCandy Pear converter kit yet? What's it like? How much is it? Etc Etc!

Of all the prams we liked the look of, the iCandy was the lightest and easiest to fold and unfold (assuming we are talking about the frame only here).



Maybe this is more a question for the retailers in the audience: Where'd Uppa Baby come from? I saw they were at JPMA, but I confess, I don't remember seeing them. From what I can gather, it's a US-based, parent/inventordriven start-up in the Boon mode, just without the fat distribution deal at Target yet.

Their website says they're launching in September with some safety and convenience products [stretchable nylon sunshades, safety gate adaptors, and there's a patent application on file for an "Illuminated security gate unit" [inspired, no doubt, by a disastrous 2AM visit to the kitchen]. But the big products are the strollers:

The G-Lite looks like a Volo with a kickstand, basically, and two hooks on the back for... I don't know, hanging it on the wall? [But why do you need the kickstand if you can hang it? It's a mystery.]

And then there's the Vista, which looks to have kind of a Bugaboo-meets-Graco Quattro Tour-meets Safety 1st Avila thing going on. Not an unattractive rig; it certainly photographs well [except for the menacing bag bracket sticking out next to the rear wheels in one pic]. The Vista is designed for the discerning parent who "is seeking a premium product alternative with the focus on relevant and logical features," which is great, but definitely not untargeted segment in this, The Year Of Our Lord Bugaboo 0005 [or 5 A.B., for short.]

I checked out the G-lite today at a local dealer. It does compare to the Maclaren Volo, but I found some distinct differences that are worth noting. First, the fold-up method is completely different. It folds from a hook on one of the handlebars...pretty cool. No more using your foot (and splitting a toenail) to push up a lever to break the stroller down. Second, the wheels are distinctly wider, i.e., stronger than Maclaren. Although I think both brands use some type of plastic wheel, the Maclaren wheel is just like one of those cheap umbrella Costco-like strollers. Uppa Baby's wheel is wider and seems more durable. Third, G-lite comes with a cushion that's easy to take on and off. And my 19-month-old son seemed to like the cushion. In fact, he didn't want to get out of the stroller! Maclaren cushions are extra. Both strollers have the carry strap. When I lifted the G-lite, I could noticably tell that is was a bit heavier...but just a tiny bit. I also noticed that it seemed longer, which may be an issue for smaller folks. I'm 5'9", so the length didn't bother me too much. And speaking of height, the handlebars seemed to be made for tall people. I wasn't bending my back at all to push the stroller. And my toes didn't kick the wheels as I walked, which was another plus. Lastly, the G-lite frame seemed a bit stronger and more durable than the Maclaren. Yet, the mesh seat in the Maclaren seemed a tiny tiny bit more reclined than the Uppa Baby, which I like because my son tends to sleep in the stroller. On the other hand, I've read reviews that some babies slide down to a slump in the Maclaren because of this seat, so the seat cushion is a necessity for these babies. (My son didn't have this problem). In conclusion, two days ago I was set on purchasing a Maclaren Volo for an upcoming trip. But after today, I've totally switched to buying a Uppa Baby G-lite. It was obvious to me that you get much more for the money with the G-lite. I just wish there was a better selection of colors to choose from. So find a local dealer and check it out for yourselves! It's worth the effort!

The iCandy Pear Will Have Another 200 Configuration Options By November

DT reader Colleen asked about new double stroller coming soon from iCandy, the Pear, almost three days ago; I've had the iCandy site open in my browser since then, and I *still* haven't seen the animation of all the configuration possibilities repeat itself. How is that possible?

The Pear is essentially the original iCandy Apple with a double conversion kit, including larger double wheels in front to support the added weight of twins or older/younger siblings. The Pear can be configured as an Applestyle, single-seat stroller [rear- or forward-facing]. But when you add the Breuer Chair-shaped element to the frame, it transforms into a double: a double capable of holding seats, carrycots, and carseats [Maxi-Cosi only at the moment] in almost any combination or configuration.

A few of the twin options remind me of the French BebeConfort twin strollers and car seat carriers, only compacted into a single-stroller footprint. A few of them also remind me of flying coach in the middle seat on a crap airline with no kneeroom.

If anyone's actually seen--or driven--a Pear with actual kids in it, I'd love to hear about it. Though with the website still promising "autumn delivery," I suspect there aren't that many on the road yet.

Rather brilliantly, the Pear conversion kit--the wheels and the Breuer bracket--are sold separately for £249. The full Pear set up is £479 with VAT [carrycots are extra]. The USD/GBP exchange rate never looked so grim, did it?

I've had hands-on with the 2009 Vista and just wanted to offer some additional details/correction to the comments.

All Vista models - including 2009 - have always folded in one piece... no need to remove the seat from the frame when folding.

Note that the UPPAbaby PiggyBack (the kiddie-board) has been out for most of 2008 and is currently available from UPPAbaby dealers.

Targeted for release in spring 2009, the Rumble Seat mounts directly above the front wheels by clipping on/off the frame. It will come with a foot rest that gets placed in the bottom of the basket. The Rumble Seat must be removed before folding the Vista. When mounted, it feels quite sturdy with durable breathable canvas stretched across a frame.

According to UPPAbaby, a parasol type of sun protection may be available with the release of the Rumble Seat. It hasn't been finalized or shown yet.

Also, while it may be tough to tell from the limited photographs at this time, UPPAbaby designed the Rumble Seat to keep a buckled toddler high enough so there is no way his/her fingers can reach the turning wheel spokes.

Mounting the Rumble Seat on the front (rather than in back) doesn't take away legroom from the pushing parent.

Can this be used with bassinet, I am guessing there is not enough room.

Or can the main seat be positioned the other way - to look at the child in the rumble seat? That would be a great feature so they can look at each other.

While the sun canopy on the Phil & Teds has certainly improved over the years, it still feels kind of small and un-shady to me. And if you don't believe me, just ask the kid in back with the lobster-red scalp and the vultures circling over his head.

Brooklynite & DT reader Amy jury-rigged some kind of canopy for the rear seat, but her mom kept stepping on it. [don't get her wrong; it's great to have grandparents close by. She's just saying...] So she flew in a Tandem Shade for the P&T from Protect-A-Bub in Australia, and now they couldn't be happier. Assuming, of course, that they didn't go outside this week; it was like 110, even in the imported shade.

Nice to see someone addressing some of the flaws in the Phil & Ted's. We recently picked up a Sport to replace our Mountain Buggy Urban Single as we awaited #2. We've been using the Sport for about a month as a single stroller and are five days into Toddler/Newborn mode. I'll start by saying that the stroller does one thing that no other stroller I know of can do: it fits two kids in relative comfort in the same footprint as other three wheelers. Now I'll say that it doesn't do this in a way that justifies its price or ubiquity in neighborhood among other parents of two (or for reasons that are even less clear, parents of one). My frame of reference includes the MB Urban Single, MacLaren Triumph and MacLaren Ralley Twin. Each of these have pros and cons but I can say that the designers got about as much as they could out of each. I hesitate to recommend strollers to people because I think there are too many personal factors that go into this decision and I will not try to talk anyone out

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of a Phil & Teds Sport (I'd probably still decide to get one today) but I'll make the following points about some flaws in the Sport because the Sport's ubiquity may lead some to think it's all roses:

- I'll start with the sunshade to stay relevant to the post. It would be nice if there was a good option for the rear child but there's no excuse for the Sport's primary canopy. First, it provides very little shade -- comparable maybe to a smaller MacLaren but this is a large, heavy stroller. Why couldn't they fit a larger canopy. It's small so it must be easy to use? Wrong. What other stroller requires the use of two eyeholes and two buttons to open the canopy? Mountain Buggy's just flop into place. MacLarens flop down and can be quickly locked/unlocked with levers. The Sport doesn't really fit right until you engage all the eyeholes and buttons and you need to undo them all to flip it up. I will say that the sunshade looks pretty cool when open but it's a pain and it doesn't block much sun. I've read that the Vibe is somewhat better in this regard but I haven't tried it.
- The fold: this thing folds like a mouse trap. Other strollers seem to move in a relatively smooth or at least predictable manner. On the Sport you need to find the two levers (they tend to get turned around so they're not the easiest to find), depress them and hope for the best. Hope no kids are around. Hope you're fingers are clear (they did add some plastic guards to help address this issue). Hope there's nothing in the basket below that will keep it from folding flat. Most strollers don't fold so well with stuff in the basket but you can usually get away with something down there. The Sport is not as forgiving.
- The Sport drives like crap. Yes it has air filled tires (love the whitewalls) so the ride is pretty smooth but this stroller is a disaster to steer. It handles better than some shopping carts but anyone who thinks this thing steers well has never been behind a Mountain Buggy. It is a challenge to keep the Sport going where you want. It doesn't track well in a straight line and it doesn't respond well when you want it to turn. I've tried to figure out what's behind this and can think of two culprits. 1) There is more weight over the front wheel than other three wheelers. 2) The pivot point for the front wheel is just barely ahead of the axle. Other strollers that handle better typically pivot from a point that's well ahead of the front axle(s) giving the driver a bit more leverage and control. I'll give the designers a pass on (1) but (2) is unacceptable. It's pathetic that it's harder to drive the P&T with one hand than my Triumph which is cheaper, flimsier and can't be steered from the center because it has two handles.
- Play in the handlebars. There's a good deal of play between the handle bar height positions. Not a big deal when you're pushing on flat ground but try to smoothly maneuver this thing up/down steps. Make sure you're not looking at your newborn down below as you crash onto each step...maybe I'm extra sensitive having just seen the shaken baby video at the hospital but it's not a pretty sight.
- Recline of the seat. A couple brands have zippered reclines (Valco also comes to mind). Why is this. Zippered reclines suck. Maybe they make the fabric fold a little neater (an upright Mountain Buggy seat gets a little sloppy around the edges) but they are a pain. They are challenge to zip up with a kid in the seat. They can only be set at specific points. Spend 20 seconds with the incredibly easy, infinitely adjustable web straps that recline a Mountain Buggy and tell me why P&T couldn't do something similar.

I'll stop now. I've got a 6-day old to enjoy and a stroller to try to learn to love. Again, P&T are have a stroller that offers something that other companies aren't but my impression is that this fact has made them a bit lazy on the engineering and design side. They've got the marketing and hip factor down...I just wish they put a little more time into fixing some pretty glaring and correctable flaws.

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

ABC Report: Phil & Teds & Steve & Jobs

It was evident at JPMA, and again at ABC Kids: in two short years, Phil & Teds is really &ing up their brand presence and their offerings. I first heard of Phil & Teds when I walked into a Right Start store in 2004. While I was asking about some other double stroller, the clerk asked if I didn't mean the Phil & Teds? That's the one people ask for, but they could never get shipments, and parents snapped them up as soon as they came in. I could get on the waitlist if I wanted, never mind there wasn't even a picture, much less a floor model to look at first.

Well, it turns out that the original Phil and Ted got bought out by one of their backers; they hooked up with Regal Lager to get a handle on distribution and marketing in the US, and then they proceeded to launch a major, comprehensive in-store brand push. One retailer in LV told me the P&T pitch was, "We take Apple as our model, whatever they do, we'll do. We're selling a lifestyle, not just a stroller."

From sleek in-store fixtures with self-consciously sexy packaging, to an array of accessories and additional products, to a new, <u>tattoo-friendly logo</u>, they appear pretty serious about that, too. I guess Phil & Teds stores where you can hang out and surf the web all day are just around the corner.

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The biggest reveal: the GT, a completely retooled, deluxe aluminum version of the E3 stroller. Think of it as a Cameleon to the E3's Frog. Or to the E3's Gecko, frankly, because the one hurdle I could never clear on the earlier E3's was the slightly off-the-shelf, workshoppy construction finish, as if Phil had built it and Ted had packed it, or vice versa. The GT looks great structurally; the fabric didn't sound like a home run, though. At first I'd heard it was a done deal, but by the time I visited the P&T Zone two days later, I was told it was just being tested, and they'd finalize it later. I hope that means there's a minimalist, logo-free version, unless they're planning on J. Lo to buy them all.

Phil & Ted's also unveiled a veil, or a particulate and UV stroller cover, called the Pollution Solution [logo fabric and kitchen table inventor rhymes? Do you get the sense that P&T hasn't quite got the Apple cloning thing down cold yet?]. I'm sure it's effective, but it's also kind of big, like a stroller muumuu or a stroller burka. Still, I can see some tasty possibilities: if you'd like to discuss putting a Daddy Types ad on the side of your Pollution Solution, C-A-L-L M-E.

The booth was stuffed full with stuff; every accessory got a sleek package, like the Cuddle & Carry newborn carrycot insert, which has a dad with a P&T logo tattooed on his bicep [do you get free strollers for life for that tat?]. P&T turn out to have bought out the makers of the sweet, aluminum Me Too Portable Chair, which we loved, but haven't ever really used [It's in the trunk, though, just in case.] And Bengt of Regal Lager did a quick demo of the P&T Latte Shaker, a one-hand, no-mess bottle for mixing formula on the go.



One thing I still need to investigate, though, was in <u>this photo I forgot I'd taken</u>: two mysterious DVD/CD-ROM's, "Phil & Teds Survival of the Hippest" and "Phil & Teds Newborns." Not sure if they're new parents guides, marketing materials, or products, but they sound like a baby gear blogger's gold mine, in any case.
